

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Tips from our President...



- 2) Every time you speak it's an opportunity. When I first started in toastmasters, I was so terrified to speak and I still had so much to learn but within three months joining a toastmasters club, I got a new job because someone saw me speak. Maybe there is a charity that you want to serve and you want people to know about it. Maybe you have to do a speech for your son's bar mitzvah and you want to try it out for the club.
- 3) **Just go for it!** If you are a good speaker you can become great. If you are a great speaker you can become a world champion. If you are terrified to speak, you can get over your fear of public speaking with baby steps. Try different roles to get your feet wet. but just jump right in. You can learn a lot of the core principles of speaking in the first three speeches.
- 4) **Don't beat yourself up**. We are too damn hard on ourselves in general. You aren't going to be perfect up there, but you can't learn public speaking in a book. You have to learn it by doing it. I've failed a bunch of times along the way by using too many notes, trying to read word for word, not being prepared, speeches that were too long, but along the way I learned. YOU WILL GET BETTER I PROMISE. We have a vision of perfection in our heads and it doesn't always come out that way.
- 5) Use the tools of the club. Remember that we are extremely hard on ourselves, and we think that we have to do it alone..a quick conversation with a mentor can help so much. Most of the mentors know where you started and can help you. Use the different roles to get better. Watch your video online to quickly determine what your mind can't see.
- 6) It's the best program in the world with the best club in toastmasters! I am not joking. I started in Toastmasters in 2000 and it's been the best development program I've ever been involved with. I've learned how to inspire people, compete in competitions, stand up comedy, persuade people and turn a weakness into a strength. Most people aren't born with public speaking skills. Create a Purposefully Passionate Speech!

Project 3 - "Get to the Point"



Congratulations, you're ready to prepare and deliver your third speech! By now, you're getting somewhat used to being in front of an audience. You understand how a speech should be organized. You've also had a chance to directly experience how supportive our wonderful Fox Talkz club really is.

Now it's time to learn how to "Get to the Point."

This third project is all about having a purpose to your speech. In other words, after the audience has heard you speak, what do you want them to know, or to do, or to believe? Be sure to choose a topic that you know really well, one about which you have a strong opinion or strong feelings, and one that you could practically talk about in your sleep! If you are very clear on your purpose, and are passionate about your topic, your speech will simply flow. It will be easier to write, easier to rehearse, and easier to deliver.

Start with deciding on your general purpose. The general purpose is the overall intention of your speech, and usually falls into one of the following categories: To Inform, To Persuade, To Entertain, or To Inspire. For example, for my third speech, entitled "Happiness is a Skill," my general purpose was To Inspire.

Next, decide on what, specifically, you'd like the audience to know, or do, or believe by the time you finish speaking. This is your specific purpose and you will build your entire speech around it, keeping it in mind at all times as you create your speech. It's a good idea to write it down so that it stays at the forefront of your mind as you write your speech. Try to keep your specific purpose focused and concise. My specific purpose was, "When I'm done speaking, the audience will have 3 tools to help them create more contentment in their lives."

Finally, go for it! When it's time to deliver your speech, speak with confidence and conviction. Be sure to keep in mind that this is a topic you know like the back of your hand. Really get into sharing your thoughts, feelings, and opinions with us. We want to know what you have to say and we're open to being informed, persuaded, entertained, or inspired! Your passion will rub off on us, and we will feel a connection with you. Just let go and have fun! We support you!

QUICK TIPS from our Sergeant at Arms

Tip #1

The first thing you say in your speech is critical. It sets the tone for the entire presentation. Either your audience will be attentive or expect to be bored. Don't start off with "I'm so glad to be here, etc." The three best ways to start your speech are:

- a. A story
- b. A question
- c. A curious statement



Your response to a mistake defines the audience's response. If you forget your place and panic, the audience will see you as someone to feel sorry for. But if you're cool and act like it's funny, the audience will do the same.

Tip #3

Being silent makes your points. We say "um" and "uh" because we're afraid of silence. It feels uncomfortable. But when a room is silent, people pay more attention.

If you constantly make sounds, the audience never gets a break. Silence gives them time to digest your points and take notes (mental or written). Even stand-up comics spend about 25% of their time in silence to let the audience laugh and enjoy the last thing they said.

To produce an effective presentation, it is vital that the person introducing the speaker be the bridge between the speaker and the audience. If the person will be speaking for less than 3 minutes, then one point of information is sufficient. If speaking from 5 to 7 minutes, then 2 or 3 items of information would be in order. This builds up the speaker who is very likely to perform better and the audience to accept the speaker with an open mind and curious about what will be said.

Once the speaker has been introduced, it is important to capture the attention of the audience immediately with a strong opening sentence. There are 4 effective ways of doing this.

- 1. Use a shocking statement
- 2. Ask a question of the audience
- 3. Use a quote
- 4. Use the names of a prominent member of the audience.

After the audience's attention is captured the contents of the speech continues until the conclusion. Again, it is vital to use a strong ending...preferably by repeating the opening sentence. This serves to bring the information full circle by tying the opening and closing remarks together like a ribbon. A strong and memorable presentation is assured for the speaker as well as the audience.
